Visit Tom Lea Murals in the Branson Library at New Mexico State University, completed in 1934 for “the A and M library in Mesilla” as part of the Works Progress Administration (WPA). Old Mesilla, illustrates scenes relevant to the town’s history such as the Gadsden

Purchase and agricultural fields; Conquistadores explores New Mexico history, touching on DeVargas, the Conquest, the Pueblo revolt of 1680, and the Reconquest.

Also on view at the kiosks in Branson and Zuhl Libraries will be an excerpt from a 1996 interview with Tom Lea in his El Paso studio.

Adair Margo will lead a special visit to the Harry Ransom Humanities Research Center (HRC) at the University of Texas at Austin for a tour of The Tom Lea collection with Peter Mears, Associate Curator, Art Collection. The Tom Lea collection was donated to the Ransom Center by Tom and Sarah Lea in June 1976 and contains 139 separate works of art, including oil portraits, watercolors, pastels, ink drawings, and mural designs. In addition to portraits and landscapes there are complete sets of drawings used to illustrate many of his books.

Opening of “*The Nesters*,” drawings completed by Tom Lea in 1936 in preparation for a mural done for the west entrance lobby of the Benjamin Franklin Postal Station on Pennsylvania Avenue in Washington, D.C. Lea completed the studies, as well as the 11’6” x 6’ mural on canvas, in his studio on Texas Street in El Paso. Tom Lea wrote about the commission in his autobiography, *A Picture Gallery*, Boston: Little Brown, 1968:

“The first mural I painted at the Hill Building was a panel for the Post Office Department Building in Washington, a commission received by winning a national competition held under the auspices of the Section of Fine Arts, Treasury Department, a government agency then recently established to provide mural and sculptural ornament in new federal buildings throughout the nation. The winning of this competition was the first nonlocal recognition I had ever received. It came at a time when it was a great help, spiritually and financially. I painted a plowman breaking dry, bare earth. Standing by the furrow was his young wife, looking at the motionless windmill, at the homesteader’s shack where they lived, and at the empty horizon. I called it “The Nesters.” I think it may be the first mature work I achieved; it was painted when I was almost thirty years old.”

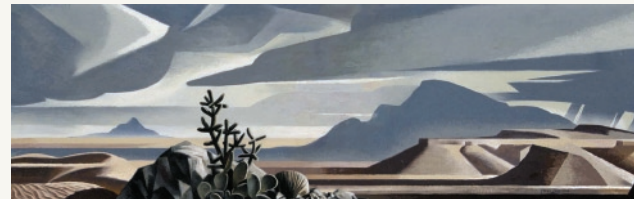
Tom Lea and World War II Special Presentation at Fort Bliss

Brendan (Mac) Greeley, USMC (ret), will share how he met Tom Lea in El Paso and wrote about Lea’s World War II experiences for journals, leading to his editing of *The Two Thousand Yard Stare, Tom Lea’s World War II*. With a sketchbook, Tom Lea went aboard a Navy destroyer in the North Atlantic in 1941; was on the carrier Hornet in 1942; traveled to England, North Africa and China in 1943; and hit the beaches of Peleliu with the 1st Marines in 1944. Few people were eyewitnesses to the war from as many perspectives as Lea and Greeley will show photographs and artwork of what Lea saw and experienced. The C.L. Sonnichsen Special Collections Department of the University of Texas at El Paso will present a display of Tom Lea photographs from China, Life Magazines, and special edition books.
